Bonita Beach Club Unit Owners Hurricane Prep Document -

Please read this and keep a copy for future reference.

For the welfare of your home and family, we trust that you will make the necessary plans and take every precaution.

Hurricane season begins June 1 through November 30.

The storm season's most intensive months are August and September.

Remember storm surge kills, Category 1 hurricanes can bring a surge of 8-10 feet. Even tropical storms can bring a surge of 1-4 feet along with sand and debris. Both can cause flooding and power outages.

If you are gone for the summer/fall season:

1. **Empty your lanai and balconies**, make sure that all patio furniture, pots, wall decor, etc. are properly stored inside your unit. You will be charged for BBC staff to perform this service if items were left outside.
2. **Shut the main water valve OFF for your unit.** You are required to do so even vacating your unit for 3 days or more.
3. **Empty refrigerators and freezers of perishable items** that could spoil, permeating the unit or ruining the appliance if power is lost.
4. **Secure storm shutters and leave the crank on the lanai.** Electric shutters will not work if power is cutoff, and your crank is then critical. It is a good idea to have maintenance of your shutters annually and test them.
5. Make sure the **office has a copy of your unit's keys** and the access code if a keypad.
6. **You are required to remove your vehicle from the BBC property once a storm/hurricane evacuation notice is made.** Please have a plan in place for this to happen if you are not able to do this yourself.

Recommendations BEFORE the Hurricane 'Season':

1. **Take a household inventory**; pictures and/or videos of your unit interior before a storm and store them off-site or electronically in the cloud.
2. **Safeguard your records**; Make copies of important papers, such as insurance documents and receipts. Store them electronically and/or off-site.
3. **Review your insurance coverage with your agent**. Many require a 30-day advance period for a new or modified policy to be effective.

STORM & HURRICANE SEASON

MANDATORY ACTIONS

It is important to **prepare**

and attend to these MANDATORY actions

BEFORE a storm arrives, especially should you decide not to evacuate.

The Office has a list of tropical storm / hurricane actions once a named storm is headed our way.

- Please do not ask staff for favors. Time is of the essence and they need to secure association equipment and common areas.
- Elevators will be halted and powered down, securing the car on the top floor (no exceptions).

Here are things YOU need to know and act on!
Stay informed and listen to news media for current conditions as the storm's forecast track and intensity can change.

Tropical Storm or Hurricane Notices:

1. **Prepare your vehicle**. Gas stations may not be operable if there is no electricity. Gas lines will also be longer as the storm nears.
2. **Withdraw cash from the bank in advance** of the storm; ATM machines may not operate without electricity.
3. BBC is in **EVACUATION ZONE A** (red zone) – Lee County or City of Bonita Springs
4. If or when Lee County or City of Bonita Springs officially orders a Hurricane Evacuation for our BBC area, **you are required to remove your vehicle from the BBC**

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property. Please contact the office if you have any questions or need help with this action. **Note:** it is not advisable to wait till the last minute for taking this action.

5. **Listen to Lee County Emergency Management and evacuate when the order is given.** Consider going to a public shelter outside the evacuation zone area if needed. If you are unable to use the stairs, you need to evacuate early. Elevators may not be in an operable mode even prior to the storm.
6. **If you decide to Shelter in Place - Notify office staff.** Once the storm has begun, emergency services will not respond until after the storm has passed. Strongly consider the possibility of no power during/after the hurricane; you will be on your own. **Supply List** if staying during a storm/hurricane:
 - a. Safety Equipment – battery operated radio, flashlight, EXTRA batteries, first aid kit, whistle, light sticks
 - b. Medical – 2wk supply of prescribed medications, cooler with ice if needed for meds
 - c. Food – drinking water (7 gallons per person), 3-4 days of non-perishable food, manual can opener
 - d. Sanitary – fill tub to use the water to flush the toilet, If the toilet is compromised, consider having/making a portable option.
7. **Close and firmly lock all doors and windows.** Place towels or noodles at the bottom inside of doors or slider tracks to limit water intrusion.
8. **Turn the refrigerator to the coldest setting** and only open when necessary.
9. **Seek refuge in an interior room** due to high winds.
10. **Designate one family member as your "out of State contact,"** and notify your family of this to reduce excessive calling, save your battery use, and reduce repeating your status unnecessarily, especially if there is a problem with the phone lines or electricity.

AFTER THE STORM/HURRICANE PASSES:

1. Call 911 for life-threatening situations.
2. Assess if it is safe to leave your unit. Remember you do not (should not) have a vehicle at BBC if an evacuation notice was given.
3. Avoid using tap water for cooking or drinking until you have been advised it is safe.
4. If there is no power, clean out the refrigerator and freezer. Turn this breaker OFF.
5. Do not wade in flood water, which can contain dangerous pathogens that cause illnesses. This water also can contain debris, chemicals, waste and wildlife. Underground or downed power lines also can electrically charge the water.
6. Document any property damage with photographs. Contact your insurance company.
7. Use diluted bleach for sterilization of areas to clean before leaving your unit and dispose of all garbage. *You'll be thankful you did.*
8. Pay attention to local officials for information and special instructions.
